Submission Guidelines for the Journal of Central Eurasian Studies (JCES)

Submissions: Please submit inquiries, manuscripts and images electronically to the Editorial Board at the following email address: cces@snu.ac.kr.

Format: Submissions should be made as email attachments using MSWord (.doc) software, and include a PDF file if using non-standard characters. All pages in the article proper must be numbered. Manuscripts must be double-spaced with 12-point type (English). Please format for A4-size paper, with 1-inch margins in all pages, including the cover page, notes, and references. Quotations longer than four lines should appear as blocked quotations, single-spaced and indented. Low resolution images and illustrations are acceptable for the reviewing process; all images, tables and figures should include titles or captions. See below for permissions and copyrights.

Contents: Submissions must contain a cover page with title and abstract (up to 150 words), in addition to the article proper. The cover page must contain the title of the article, authorøs name, full contact information (including email, academic and/or professional affiliation, current mailing address, and telephone numbers).

Length: Articles submitted for consideration, including notes, should not exceed 12,000 words. Notes should be as few as possible and appear at the end of the text.

Pagination: The text should clearly indicate the placement of tables, maps, illustrations, etc. When they are used within the text, all labeling and citations must follow the guidelines given in the most current edition of the *Chicago Manual of Style*. Contributors will be responsible for obtaining permission to reproduce any material (including photographs and illustrations) for which they do not hold copyright, in order to ensure appropriate acknowledgments in the manuscript.

Endnotes: All submissions must use endnotes as the documentation formatô articles using other systems will not be considered. Endnotes must follow the most current edition of the *Chicago Manual of Style*. Notes should be sequentially superscripted throughout the text, and appear in the same form at the end of the document. No parenthetical references should appear in the text. Each endnote should contain full bibliographical information, including page numbers. Do not indicate page numbers using õp.ö or õpp.ö
